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Bigfoot? Yeti? The Loch Ness Monster? Cryptozoologist Tells All In Daily News Exclusive

Ever since the famous Patterson-Gimlin film of 1967 gained national recognition, cryptids have been the source of global intrigue. I do. I've had the fortune to see multiple cryptids with my own eyes, and have photographic evidence of their existence that I am preparing to publish.

For decades, cryptids have eluded cryptozoologists such as yourself. How were you able to track them down?

The answer is quite simple, Tom. You've seen what's happening around the globe. Magic has begun to pervade every aspect of our world. When I first heard about it, I knew that it could be the missing key to everything I've been searching for. So I began to study the phenomenon in great detail. May I go on a bit of a tangent?

Please do!

I hypothesize that their diet cannot be properly satiated in whatever world it's from, so it's adapted by occasionally crossing over into our world to feed on our livestock.

That is truly a remarkable find!

More than remarkable - it changes everything about the realm of science we know! As soon as I publish my findings on this study of cryptids, I intend to dedicate my time to figuring out how to cross over into their world. Think of the discoveries that could be made, the wonders that await on the other side, the magnificent creatures we would be able to study!

Do you think your research will be impacted by your imminent renown?

I don't anticipate fame impacting me. Undoubtedly, the research labs that have turned me down in the past will be scrambling for me to sign my name on a piece of paper now, eager to take credit for my work. But I've learned that I don't need them. I have been far more than capable of conducting my research on my own, and I have no intention of changing that up now.

There you have it.
